Coronation Street's Kym Ryder reveals why it's OK to be different, why her kids have made her life better, and why being in the soap is such a great job...

When Kym Ryder was named Tesco magazine Mum of the Year, it was an honour she was thrilled with.

The actress had children David, now 12, and Emily, 10, by the time she was 21.

'Luckily I've never been much of a party girl, so I don't ever feel I've missed out,' she says.

'My kids have just made my life better. 'I owe everything to my parents, they gave me the best possible start. I would love my kids to look at me in the same way and be proud of me.'

Kym has travelled a long way from the insecure teenager who was picked on by bullies while growing up in Wigan.

'Even now my stomach churns when I pull up outside a school, she says. 'And my worst fear is that my children will suffer from bullying too.

'I don't know why I was picked on. Maybe it was because I was bit different - I wanted to be in shows rather than chase after boys.

'But whatever the reason, some of the other girls at school would use any excuse they could to call me names.

'Like the fact I didn't develop as quickly as everyone else, or that my dad had lost his business and we didn't have much money.

'They'd call me a scrubber because of the old car he drove. It was hideous. 'I'm still haunted by the memory of

those school bullies punching me in the face and pulling my skirt up in the middle: can take over your life. I couldn't of the playground.

'I used to blame myself and think there was something wrong with me, she says, close to tears.

'But the main thing to remember is that the problem lies with the bully, not the victim.

'Working through the experience has made me a stronger person. 'But there should be more severe

punishments for children who bully. If there were, maybe there wouldn't be children taking their own lives as a result.

'School years are a very sensitive, and often difficult, time in a child's life so the last thing they need is to be bullied too.

'There's nothing wrong with being different. The funniest thing is when I hear that those same bullies have told people they used to be friends with me, she laughs. 'It's pretty ironic.'

Kym, 32, has put her own unhappy experiences to good use by supporting the charity BeatBullying.

'I felt very isolated from other children growing up so it's nice to be able to share my experience and show you can come out the other side of a traumatic situation and be better for it, she says.

Kym still suffers from panic attacks, which may be connected with the low self-esteem that resulted from being bullied at school.

'People find panic attacks difficult to understand, she says. 'The attacks are irrational, but it's a real illness and it's not simply a case of pulling yourself together.

'When I have an attack I can't breathe. It's as if someone's sitting on my chest, and everything feels really strange. I had one when I was driving and I thought I was dying.

'It was terrifying. But they're a lot more common than people realise.

'Mine started at 21 and they go into my corner shop. It might : seem silly, but I'd start to sweat : because I knew the last time I was in there I'd had an attack.'

Kym had counselling and tried hypnotherapy, but neither helped. It wasn't until she had a series of bizarre therapy sessions with : a life coach, which included

being squirted with paint and regressing to talk to her late grandfather, that Kym experienced a breakthrough.

'I hadn't driven a car on the motorway for years as I didn't want to get into a situation where couldn't stop if I had an attack, she explains. 'But now I drive myself to work, which I never thought I'd be able to do.

These days

condition to be like an old friend. I know what will happen if I do have an attack, so they don't last as long. In fact, I haven't suffered an attack for over two years.'

Kym's determination shines through every area of her life. Despite recently separating from her husband of six years, former EastEnder Jack Ryder, the pair remain good friends. And Kym is adamant the split won't affect her children.

'I choose to keep our home life private as much as I can. I don't like reading about other people's relationships - it's no-one's business but the people involved - which is why I tend to stay out of the limelight.

'The attention can be especially hard on your family as they're not used to it. And I want to protect David and Emily.'

Meanwhile, Kym's career is thriving. She has received professional acclaim, winning awards for best soap newcomer for her role as Michelle Connor in Coronation Street. And for Kym her current job on the nation's favourite street is a dream come true.

'My first day at Corrie was nerveracking, she says. I was meeting all these people I'd watched for years.

'I worried about whether they'd welcome me or think I wasn't really an actress, and how the press and the public would react.

'But everyone was lovely. I've been good friends with Beverley Callard (Liz) and Ian Reddington (Vernon) ever since.

'The main reason I left the pop group Hear'Say was because the music industry is very fly-by-the-seat-of-your-pants.

'You have to be seen everywhere. People are buying your product so you have to remind them you're there.

'I didn't have any time to see my kids. And I just couldn't survive like that!


